

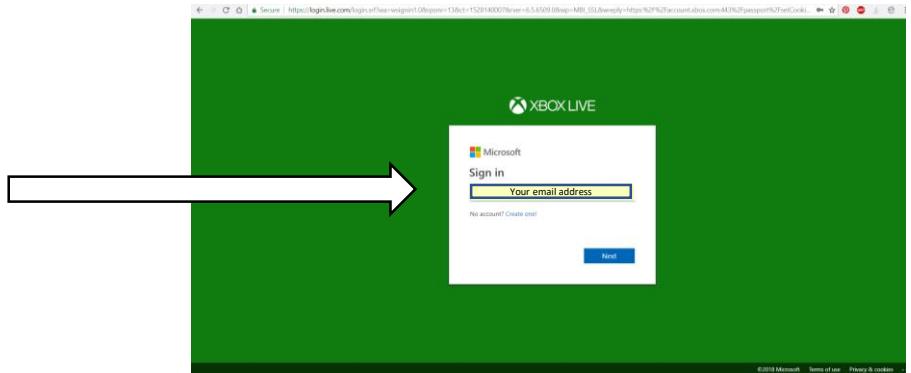


How to set up a family membership

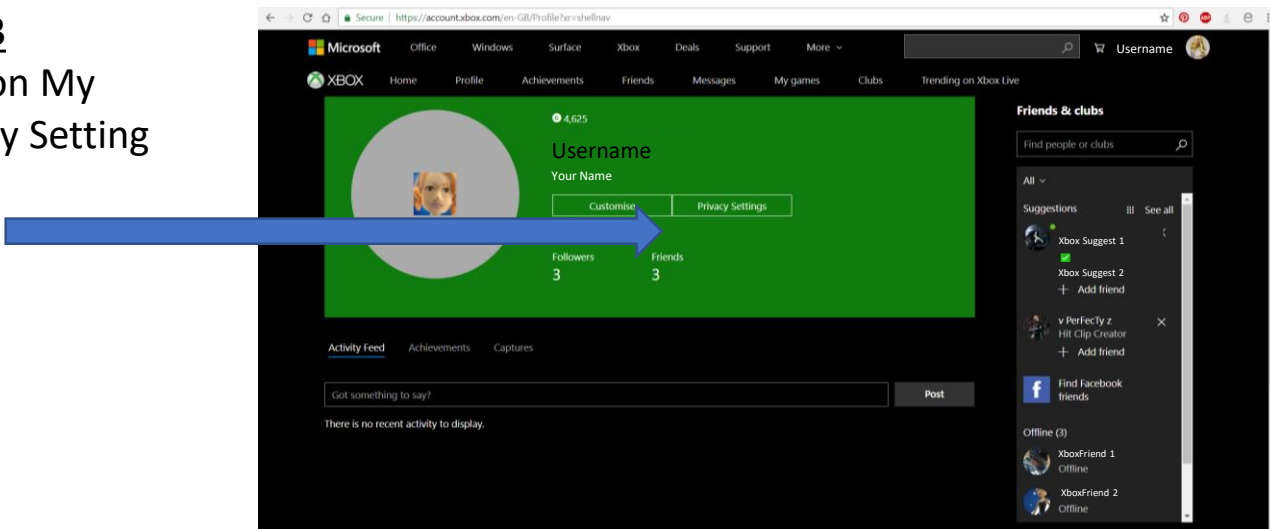
Step 2

Click on Profile

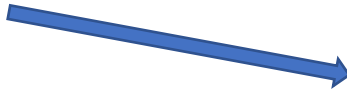
Step 3

Privacy & online safety

The gamepics below show the people in your Xbox family. To change someone's privacy and online safety settings, select their gamepic, then make changes, then press Save. Any adult in the family can manage the settings for all the children in the family, but children can only see (and not set) their own settings. Parents if you update your child's settings, they will need to log out and log in for them to take effect.

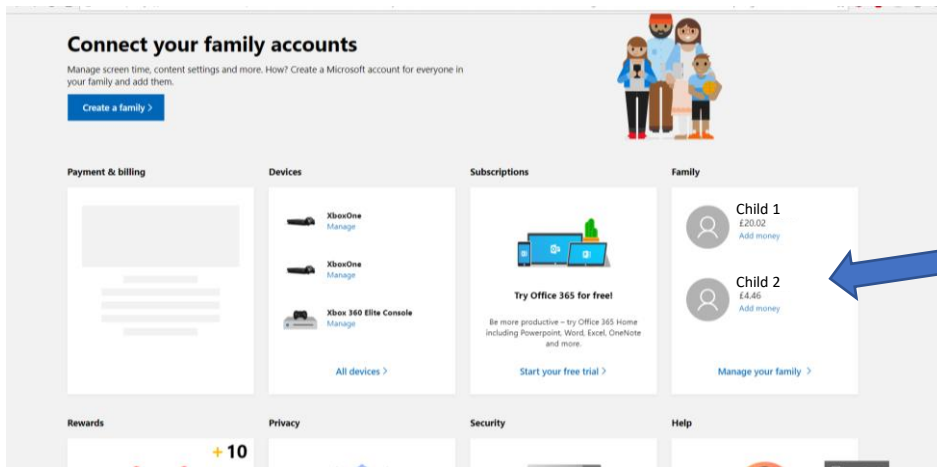

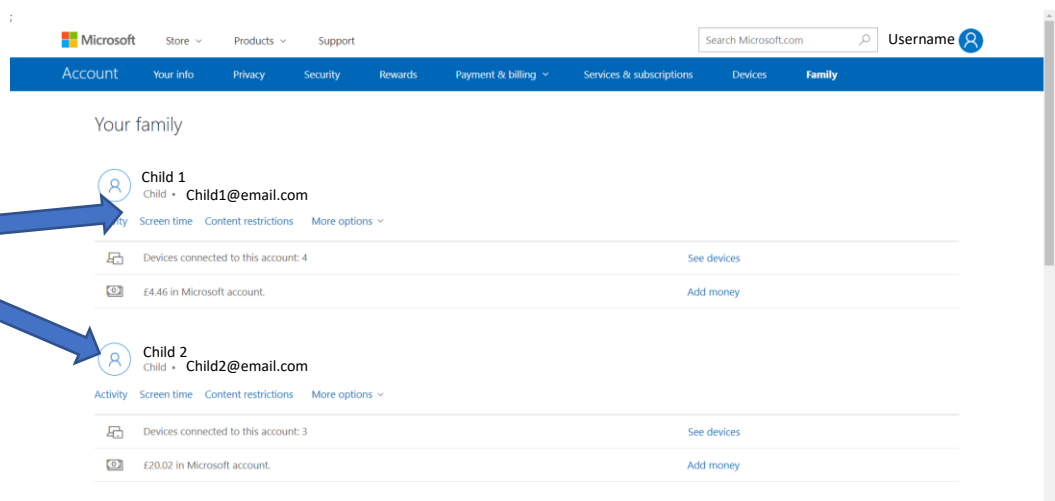

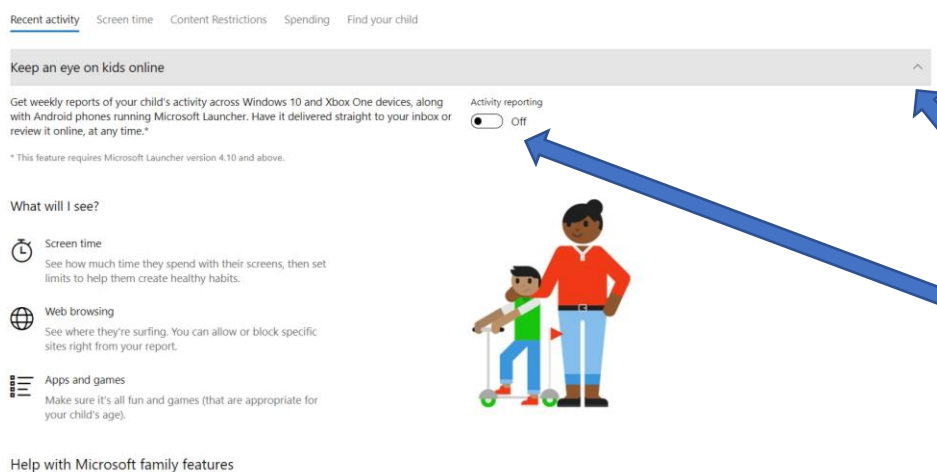

Step 9
Look at recent activity – if this is not activated, click on the little arrow and activate. You will then receive weekly reports about your child's activity across Windows and XboxOne, along with Android phones running Microsoft Launcher.

Screen time that's simple

Create a screen time schedule for your child that applies across their Windows 10 and Xbox One devices. Just turn it on, then decide how much time you want to allow each day, and when they can use it.

Step 10

Screen Time – this allows you to schedule screen time across Windows 10 and XboxOne devices.

Step 11

Content Restrictions – turn this one if you want to give approval for things a child can buy. Enables you to set age limits to block inappropriate apps and websites.

Ask a parent

Turn this on to require adult approval for the things that your child wants to buy in the Microsoft Store – except for what they get with gift cards or money in their Microsoft account.

Apps, games & media

Set an age limit to block inappropriate apps, games and media. Anything that exceeds the content ratings you've decided are appropriate for your child will need your approval. This setting applies to Windows 10 and Xbox One devices.

This setting only works with Microsoft Edge and Internet Explorer on Windows 10 and Xbox One devices and blocks commonly used browsers to help keep your child safer. To unblock them, go to **Always blocked** in the **Apps, games & media** section above.

Add money to kids' Microsoft accounts, so they can buy what they want, without spending too much. Set content restrictions to help protect them from stuff that's too mature.


On the Spending tab, you can add money and to their Microsoft accounts and set content restrictions to protect them from things that are too mature.
